On Sunday 23rd June, in preparation for our fundraising for this charity for the next sixth months, we had a presentation – oral and audio visual. We learned of how people can be trapped in a slavery situation and how to look out for signs of this having taken place. We were told of Hope for Justice's aim to end slavery by:

PREVENTING exploitation, RESCUING victims, RESTORING lives and REFORMING society.

We heard about some individual cases and what was done to help the victims and, sometimes, to return them to their families if appropriate. What was particularly shocking was learning that such exploitation and slavery was happening on our own doorstep. We felt ashamed that slavery could happen anywhere in this day and age but especially as regards this country and this area. We also felt angry and were glad the Church has chosen to support this so worthwhile charity. [Editor]

6. Notes from the Elders' Meeting held on Wednesday 5th June 2019




1. Sandy gave a summary of Kath's and his time in the USA with members of the UCC (United Churches of Christ).

The mantra of the UCC is:

'Whoever you are, wherever you are, you are welcome here'.

- The UCC have addressed gender issues, but there are divisions in the UCC over race issues. They are keen to promote diversity inclusion, but some congregations still have an issue with black ministers not being acceptable to white congregations and in such instances these congregations will not be forced to change their views.
- Immigration is a hot topic due to the current situation with the Mexican border.
- Many members were fascinated by Megan's royal baby and this prompted discussion on people of mixed race.
- A few members were Trump supporters.
- There is an interest in 'Celtic Links' and there was a discussion on the possibility of a pilgrimage to Iona, Holy Isle etc. with the hope that local churches could facilitate. The elders noted that Durham Cathedral's Summer School runs a Celtic Links programme.
- A debate on the climate showed that everybody agrees with the evidence on climate change. Elders noted that our synod has appointed a part time Green Apostle.
- The UCC has links with protestants in Germany, Poland, Czechoslovakia and also Waldensian congregations in Italy and elsewhere. Elders noted that in the past our church has also had links with the Waldensians.
- There were 'Speak Outs' which allow 10 people the chance to talk about anything (including just getting something 'off your chest') for 1 minute.
- There was Communion during and after meals and the worship was 4 hymns one after the other, then prayers.
- 2. Sandy Ogilvie and the Revd John Durell have organised the format for the service on Sunday 23rd June which will launch our fundraising for the Hope for Justice charity.
- 3. Our church members have been invited to Butler Day (a celebration for the end of the academic year) at Josephine Butler College. There are plans for continued links with the college and some joint day trips. Yvonne Melville and David Thornborrow have been invited to the Durham University Volunteer Awards 2019 on 17th June. It is hoped that there will be photographs of this event to put in 'The Review'.
- 4. The amended Elders' Districts List was discussed, finalised and agreed.
- 5. Sandy Ogilvie continues to investigate the possible shared ownership of a defibrillator with the Waddington Street Centre and our Church.
- 6. The elders discussed the possibility of members of the Foundation Charity doing some tidying around the outside of the church in response to their kind offer to help.
- 7. The elders were delighted to hear that Revd Ruth Crofton will welcome and admit Val Hodgson to membership of our church on Sunday 9th June 2019
- 8. The elders agreed rates for funeral fees.
- 9. Sandy Ogilvie has been invited to a launch to be held in Durham Town Hall on 11th June because he provided information to 'Visit County Durham' on our church which will be included on a map of Durham City Churches, Chapels and Cafés. Refreshments are being served at the event. Unfortunately, Sandy is unable to attend and he hoped that somebody would be able to go as a representative of our Church. (Janet Thornborrow)

When Ron and I were in Scotland we visited Inverary Castle in Argyllshire. Having been born into the Campbell Clan, I could not miss this opportunity to visit the ancestral home of the Dukes of Argyll – Chieftains of the Campbell Clan. Sadly, I could not find any direct line to any of the Dukes, but we found the Castle to be a most impressive and interesting place just the same.

In one of the State rooms, called the Saloon, a general function room, there is a grand piano which has a remarkable history of its own. Lerner and Loewe who composed the music for "My Fair Lady", composed several of the songs when staying in the Castle.



We discovered also that one of the Christmas Specials for "Downton Abbey" was filmed at the Castle and there were some photos of the cast on display.

As we have been watching the recent TV drama series about Queen Victoria, we discovered another interesting fact.


Queen Victoria's fourth daughter, Princess Louise, married

into the Campbell family. She married the Marquis of Lorne who later became the Ninth Duke of Argyll. They were married on 21st March 1871 in St. George's Chapel, Windsor which is also where Prince Harry and Meghan Markle were married.

After visiting the Castle and enjoying Afternoon Tea and cake in the café, we then explored the gardens. The landscaped gardens were really beautiful with acres of rhododendrons and azaleas which were just at their best.



Red squirrels are reportedly much in evidence at Inverary, although, to our disappointment, we did not see any. We were fortunate the weather was dry and bright which made our visit even more enjoyable. *Heather Todd*



Across the pond!

Earlier this year we were asked by our Synod to attend the Annual meeting of the United Church of Christ in New York State. Given the distance involved, we decided to make the trip a holiday and drop in on the meeting. We landed in New York City in the middle of May in torrential rain which thankfully cleared up overnight and let us enjoy a day walking along the "High Line". This is an elevated walkway stretching around two miles each way on a disused railroad in the centre of Manhattan near to the Hudson river. It features wildflowers, greenery and outdoor art installations in addition to some stunning views of New York's skyline. On the streets below is Chelsea market, a place to meander through and view a great mix of craft, art and street food.

From New York we travelled for about one and a half hours by train along the Hudson river to Poughkeepsie, to be given a great welcome by the delegates of the UCC Annual meeting. One of the reasons we visited the conference was to promote ties with them and offer them the chance to walk the Celtic Pilgrimage from Melrose to Lindisfarne in July led by our moderator Dave Herbert. We have reported the highlights of this conference to both the Elders and the recent Church meeting.

On leaving Poughkeepsie we stayed with the Lawrence family back in New York. We visited their



Church of the Living Hope and saw some of the work they are doing with the East Harlem community. This is a relatively poor area, with people, young and old, pushed to the edge and the Lawrences are working to give these people purpose and hope through projects to combat loneliness and isolation; by promoting the local culture; through community art and with street parties.

From there we went to Boston by train and stayed in an Airbnb overlooking Boston Common. Boston is a fine city with much to see and do. Highlights were visiting the Museum of Fine Arts, which included a major exhibition of the works of Toulouse-Lautrec and then the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum. Isabella Gardner was left US\$1.6m by her father in the 1860s and was then able to travel and collect some fabulous artefacts, tapestries and furniture from all around the world. These are displayed in a wonderful building which has a very tranquil and beautiful garden at its centre.



We were in Boston on Memorial Day where we saw a display of over 65,000 Stars and Stripes flags on the Common - one flag for every person from Boston who has died in conflict. As the weather was being kind, we took to the sea for two trips - one to St. George's Island within the confines of the Outer Boston Harbour on which there is a fort. Fort Warren was built from 1833-61 around the time of the American Civil war. It had over 30 gun emplacements but only one cannon! and the song "John Brown's body" was written at the camp and uses the tune from an old Methodist camp song.



The other longer boat trip took us to Provincetown and Cape Cod. Provincetown is an attractive small town full of artists, potters and folky musicians. We enjoyed another day of relaxation and sunshine by the sea and added another few miles to the many we walked on this interesting holiday.

All good things come to an end hence you now see us back in Durham.

Minutes of the Church Meeting held on 16th June 2019

Present - 22 Apologies - 9

1. Sandy Ogilvie welcomed everyone to the Meeting which opened with prayer.

2. The Minutes of the March Meeting were accepted as a true record.

3. Matters arising -

* Kath Ogilvie gave various property updates.

- * The refurbishment of the manse kitchen is now almost completed.
- * The church gutters have been cleaned and the tree has been removed from the church spire.
- * The damaged window-light in the kitchen will be replaced soon at a cost of $\pounds 300$ to $\pounds 400$.
- * The Property Group will tomorrow discuss the central heating in the manse.
- * There are continued problems with the church hall toilets which are being fixed.

* On behalf of the Meeting, Sandy Ogilvie welcomed our new church member, Mrs. Val Hodgson, to the Church Meeting.

4. Church Projects -

Sandy Ogilvie informed the Meeting that our project for the first part of this year concludes this month. The church has raised over £2,500 for the Great North Air Ambulance Service. We will begin collecting for the next church project from 1^{st} July. This is "Hope For Justice", an organisation which exists to bring to an end modern slavery. At our service on Sunday 23^{rd} June, our guest speaker will be Nicola Lloyd, who will give us information on this organisation and answer any questions which arise, after we move into the hall.

5. The Vacancy Update -

We now have two members of our church on the new Group Council, Ian Graham and Les Thomson. A report from the Group was given by Les Thomson.

* Posts on the new council have been allocated and Les Thomson has been appointed to the Chair. Sandy Ogilvie congratulated and thanked Les on behalf of the Meeting

* For the moment, churches will be asked to continue looking after their own manses.

- * Each church will give the Group an annual financial statement and membership numbers.
- * Observers will be welcome at Group Council Meetings.
- * A Group Bank Account has been set up.

* Each church will continue with its own website and eventually a Group Website will be set up.

* There will be no further meetings of the Group until the autumn, unless developments occur. At the moment we have no applicants for the group ministry.

6. The Defibrillator -

Many vulnerable people use our premises and the Resource Centre, but at the moment the nearest defibrillator is at the University Hospital. Fred Robinson and Sandy Ogilvie are looking at the possibility of the Resource Centre and our church making a joint effort to acquire one. The cost would be about £750 each. Dr. Rosemary Woods would be willing to help with the training. The Meeting gave this suggestion unanimous support.

7. The United Church of Christ, New York State -

* During their recent trip to U.S.A., Kath and Sandy Ogilvie attended the Annual General Meeting of this church, which has contact with the Northern Synod of our church.

* It is a church which is very liberal on gender issues, with the mantra "Who ever you are and wherever you are on life's journey, you are welcome here".

* It is a church which gives a great deal of attention to the issues of race, immigration and climate change.

* It has links with the Waldensian Church.

* Sandy and Kath were made very welcome at this extremely welcoming church and were clearly impressed with its openness, its enthusiasm and the energy of its members.

8. <u>A.O.B.</u> -

* Lucille Thomson wondered whether something could be done about the lights in the sanctuary. They are very high and changing bulbs is very difficult and costly. She wondered whether it would be possible to lower them. Kathleen Clasper explained that the real obstacle to lowering them was the false ceiling, which would make any work there extremely hazardous. If we did decide to change the lighting, one possibility would be to install wall lights.

* Janet Sarsfield explained that she and our treasurer, Michèle Woods had discussed possible changes to the costs of hiring out our premises. Suggestions would be discussed by the Property Group and the Elders.

9. The Meeting ended with the Grace.
