Dear friends,

A marketing email popped into my inbox a few days ago that got me thinking. A certain firm of accountants has had the idea of a '28 Days of Lockdown Movie Marathon'. In their own words, but with my emphasis: "Our team have got together and shared some of our favourite films and formed a "28 Days of Lockdown" advent calendar for our clients and anyone else that can enjoy it!"

On the one hand, this is somewhat cheeky. Advent is first and foremost Advent: the season before Christmas when we focus on the advent of Jesus Christ. Even with a small 'a', advent is the arrival of a person or thing (according to the Oxford English Dictionary). So, to apply the word in the context of a Lockdown Movie Marathon, as a countdown to the easing of restrictions, might seem to be a misappropriation. On the other hand, an 'advent calendar' to get us through twenty-eight days of restrictions gets to the very heart of what Advent (proper Advent with a capital 'A') truly means.

The advent of Jesus which we celebrate in Advent is a time when we remember those who cry 'how long must we wait!' Whether the people of Israel occupied by the Romans who longed for the coming of the Messiah, or the people of now who yearn for the end of this pandemic, the desire of Advent is for light to shine, and for it to shine NOW!

We're trudging on through our very own darkness, our own Winter of Discontent bringing to mind Shakespeare's 'Richard III' as well as the industrial unrest of 1978/9. But as Isaiah said: "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness on them light has shined." (Isaiah 9: 2) Jesus who makes it clear that the words of Isaiah have already been fulfilled through him (Matthew 4:16). As people of Jesus we're living in tomorrow's world today. That is not to deny the suffering of the present moment - the pain of losses which are mounting up. However, as Jesus says, we can change the way we think, turn to God, and realise that the real power of God is near and now.

I know some people get hot under the collar when Christmas merchandise fills supermarket shelves immediately after All Hallows' Eve (to give it it's proper name). Many will be chuntering at the recent appearance of Christmas decorations - lights at Roker, tree in Low Fell - but the early onset of tinsel reflects the reality that Jesus has already arrived. Not that we have to eat turkey, sprouts, and mince pies daily to live in the reality of Christmas every day. Simply living in light, with a light-filled attitude and a heart of light towards all will suffice. Advent then becomes less of a countdown and more of an affirmation of what is now, with lament that things are not quite as they will be. Advent is not so much about wistful yearning for a great escape but a brave embrace of the baby Jesus born in us today.

The 'little town of Bethlehem' may be far away in time and space. However, in the words of the carol, now "God imparts to human hearts the blessings of his heaven: where meek souls will receive him, still the dear Christ enters in."

May I and my family wish you all a blessed, light-filled, and truly contented Christmas.

Church Christmas Appeal

In an article in the November issue of The Review, Kath Ogilvie reminded us of our usual practice to fundraise and give support to Charities, usually one "local" and one "international".

At the Elders' meeting on 4th November, it was decided to launch a Church Christmas Appeal and that the proceeds would be split between St. Cuthbert's Hospice (a local charity) and Christian Aid (an international charity).

We have always supported Christian Aid but this year no donation could be made from the Harvest Lunch as it could not take place due to the Covid 19 restrictions.

St. Cuthbert's Hospice have not been able to hold their usual Fund raising efforts and also, as their retail shops were closed in the first lockdown (and have now been closed again), they are operating at a loss of £300,000 this year. They made an urgent appeal recently in the Northern Echo for help to replace the expected loss and have now passed the £50,000 milestone on their way to their goal of £300,000. We have all faced huge challenges during this pandemic but no more so than those in our community with life limiting illnesses, people approaching the end of life and people who are bereaved. The Hospice needs our help so that their free care can continue.

Ways of raising funds for the Christmas Appeal were discussed at the Elders' meeting and we hope to put together a Christmas Quiz, plan to have a Christmas photography competition where folk can submit their photographs, funny or otherwise, which Marcus has agreed to judge and Yvonne has already started to knit Christmas coats for Chocolate Oranges. Further details of these proposals will be given later and the Elders hope that you will all enjoy taking part in these fundraising efforts as these charities need our help in these difficult times.

What's YOUR favourite Christmas film?

I was once discussing family customs with a group of work colleagues. When the subject came around to films which we particularly associate with Christmas, one colleague said, 'well, we can't start Christmas until we have had our Christmas Eve lunch, sat down with a sherry and watched "It's a Wonderful Life". That's not a bad idea, I think: it's a wonderful film, brim-full of pathos, romance, supernatural allusion, and, of course, LOTS of snow. No wonder it has remained a Christmas favourite since its first release in 1957.

But what of Dickens's "A Christmas Carol"? That story was released as a film in 1938 in New York and has grown in popularity ever since. If professor Google is to be believed, this most famous Christmas story has suffered 135 film adaptations, the latest being **Bharat Nalluri's** *The Man Who Invented Christmas*, released in 2017.

I wonder whether there are any strong alternatives to these "Big Two"? Does anyone have their own recommendations for Christmas viewing?

I'd like to suggest my own favourite seasonal story. It is a light-hearted film first released in 1954 (pre-dating "It's a Wonderful Life" by 2 years). Its main character, played by Charles Laughton, is father to three daughters, all intent on following their liking of the latest fashions into adulthood and relying on their pompous Dad to find them husbands. A very young John Mills plays Willie, Laughton's talented but naive shoe-maker, who is spotted and courted by the eldest daughter – much to the father's chagrin.

The story is one of redemption as the father – Henry Horatio Hobson – travels from being a penny-pinching, suspicious, drunken, male chauvinist to upright member of the local Manchester cobbling community via alcohol-induced hallucinations and a realisation of his own weaknesses. Along the way, Horatio's eldest daughter, played by Brenda de Banzie, inspires Willie to shoe-making success, a shop of their own, and finally rescuing the contrite Hobson from his own blind incompetence. Oh – and the film contains the most touching wedding night scene EVER, plus – a must for Christmas viewing – there is snow – but just a little.

Notes from Elders' Meeting on Wednesday 4th November 2020 (by Zoom)

- 1. Minutes of the last meeting held on Wednesday 7 October 2020 were accepted as a true record, to be signed and filed when appropriate.
- 2. Matters arising from the minutes of the meeting of 7 October 2020 -
- a) Keys to the church have all been returned. This was necessary for insurance purposes.
- b) Sandy has been liaising with the Resource Centre and they are unbelievably grateful for the use of our building and our continuing support of them.
- c) Marcus reported that a Zoom meeting has been organised with Andrew Tinkler and a student representative from Josephine Butler College to discuss the intergenerational student programme.
- d) Marcus reported that nominations are coming in, following our request for new Elders; closing date is 18 November.
- e) The church is closed again following the new lockdown regulations in England so the Remembrance Service cannot go ahead as planned. We will be reverting back to worshipping via Zoom and we will observe the two minutes silence during our online service. We will, of course, send a donation to the Poppy Appeal as originally agreed.
- 3. District Reports Reports were given with those mentioned to be remembered in prayer.
- 4. Correspondence Sandy reported on a general enquiry from a young couple who hope to get married in January in a Registry Office in Newcastle and are looking for a church in which they can have a blessing following the marriage. It is very difficult to predict now, what the situation regarding Covid-19 will be at that time, but it was agreed that it would be good to be as welcoming as possible. Marcus will get in touch with them.
- 5. Charity Fundraising It was acknowledged that many charities this year will be struggling. We discussed ways of trying to raise funds and have decided to launch a Church Christmas Appeal. The proceeds will be split between St. Cuthbert's Hospice and Christian Aid. Doris agreed to write an article for the church magazine about St Cuthbert's Hospice where she has been a volunteer for many years. Yvonne agreed to put together a Christmas Quiz, the logistics of which have still to be finalised. We also plan to have a Christmas Photography Competition where folk can submit their photographs, funny or otherwise, which Marcus has agreed to judge. Sandy will speak to Michèle as to the best way to handle any money in relation to these events.
- 6. Website Update and Live Streaming of Services
- Marcus' suggestions for updating the website were reviewed and agreed. Sandy will continue to deal with email enquiries. The old Facebook page still exists but it was agreed that focusing on the website is the key priority at the moment. The use of Zoom and livestreaming of services were also discussed as ways of reaching out primarily to our church family and also the wider community. Sandy intimated that there might be grants available to help fund new technology.
- 7. Services under New Lockdown Regulations We have had to cancel all of November's services and revert back to worshipping via Zoom. It is hoped that we will be able to worship in church in December, although we cannot be certain. A decision was taken to cancel the Christmas Morning service. Marcus will be taking the service on Christmas Eve, assuming we are allowed to open.
- 8. Christmas Cards Yvonne has received the pack from which we normally select our church Christmas cards. It was agreed to send cards to those organisations that normally use our premises, as well as to our congregation. Normally details of all our Christmas services are listed on the Christmas card, but as the situation is so unpredictable at the moment, it was agreed to have a link to our website instead, as it will have the latest information regarding services. Distribution of the cards will be discussed at our December meeting.
- 9. Client Engagement An email has been received from Anthony Oliver from Foundation, an organisation which has frequently used our premises in the past. They support individuals and families affected by situations such as homelessness, domestic abuse, leaving prison and leaving the care system. They are currently in the process of revamping their welcome pack and have asked if our church would like to be included in their literature. Marcus will make contact with Anthony to progress this.
- 10. Eco Church is an award scheme designed to motivate and resource churches in England and Wales to care for God's earth as part of their everyday work and witness. It was agreed that a working party be formed to look into this more fully with a view to working towards accreditation. The names of a few people who might be interested in joining a working party were discussed. It is hoped that we will get guidance from Trevor Jamieson, the Synod's Green Apostle.

11. AOB

It was noted with pleasure that we have recently had some folk returning to worship with us. It would be good to allocate an Elder to them, if they would like one. It was agreed to wait until any new Elders have been appointed as we will look at revising the Elders' districts at that point.



- 1. O Holy Night Poem by Placide Cappeau 1847 celebrating the church organ's renovation.
- **2. Silent Night -** During the Christmas truce of 1914 during World War I, the carol was sung simultaneously by English and German troops.
- 3. In the Bleak Mid-Winter Gustav Holst version poem by Christina Rossetti.
- **4. In the Bleak Mid-Winter** Harold Darke version is the most popular one.
- 5. Hark! The Herald Angels Sing Words by Charles Wesley, tune by Mendelssohn.
- **6.** O Come All Ye Faithful It is unclear who first wrote the music or lyrics to this hymn.
- 7. O Come, O Come Emmanuel Sung at both Advent and Christmas.
- **8.** Coventry Carol The lyrics refer to the 'Massacre of the Innocents' by King Herod.
- **9. O Little Town of Bethlehem** Rector Phillips Brooks wrote this hymn when inspired by the view of Bethlehem from the hills of Palestine. His church organist Lewis Redner wrote the melody.
- 10. It Came Upon a Midnight Clear lyrics Edmund Sears, refer to ideas of war and peace.
- 11. Once in Royal David's City words by children's poet Mrs. Cecil Frances Alexander.
- **12. In Dulci Jubilo -** This dates back to the Middle Ages.
- 13. Joy to the World In the '90s, this was the most-published Christmas hymn in North America.
- **14. God Rest Ye Merry, Gentlemen -** One of the oldest Christmas carols on the list, in early English it actually means something closer to 'remain bountiful, gentlemen'.
- **15. Away in a Manger -** This late 19th-century carol is hugely popular with children.
- **16.** Sussex Carol music by Ralph Vaughan Williams after he heard it sung near Sussex.
- 17. Shepherd's Pipe Carol John Rutter composed it when he was just a schoolboy.
- **18. The Three Kings -** Written in 1857 by Peter Cornelius.
- 19. Gabriel's Message text Luke's Gospel, the melody is taken from Basque tradition.
- **20. Jesus Christ the Apple Tree -** performed as a carol by choirs around the world.
- **21. Gaudete -** The oldest carol on the list, possibly composed in the late 16th century.
- **22.** The Holly and the Ivy inspired by the hope that the singers would also survive the winter.
- **23.** Carol of the Bells arrangement by John Williams for the film Home Alone.
- **24. See Amid the Winter's Snow -** Also known as 'Hymn for Christmas Day'.
- **25. Ding Dong! Merrily on High** the tune was originally a secular dance tune.
- **26.** Candlelight Carol John Rutter's music is always popular at this time of year.
- **27.** Good King Wenceslas based on the life of Wenceslas, Duke of Bohemia.
- **28. Angels From the Realms of Glory -** by Scottish poet James Montgomery printed 1816.
- **29.** The First Nowell is actually of Cornish origin not French.
- **30. What Sweeter Music -** With lyrics by 17th-century poet Robert Herrick, John Rutter composed this carol for the choir of King's College, Cambridge.


A NEW YEAR'S WISH
